100th Anniversary of Noh Stage in Fukuyama Special Performance by the Kita School Oshima Family

A special performance marking the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Kita School Oshima Nohgaku Theater was held in Fukuyama on Dec. 22. Masanobu Oshima, 71, the fourth generation of the family's Noh performers, performed the lead role in *Tokusa* before an audience of approximately 400. *Tokusa*, a play on the theme of a father's love for his son, is rarely staged. Mr. Oshima, a Holder of Important Intangible Cultural Property, was the recipient of this year's Chugoku Cultural Award, which is presented by the Chugoku Shimbun.

The program began with a *shimai* dance by Mr. Oshima's daughter, Kinue, 39.



For *Tokusa*, Mr. Oshima wore the mask of an old man and, in a performance marked by economy of movement, depicted the man's feelings for his son as the two are parted. The role of the son was played by Mr. Oshima's grandson, Iori, 5.

In a separate play, Mr. Oshima's son, Terushisa, 37, appeared as a *shishi* lion to generous applause.

The original Noh stage was built in 1914 by Mr. Oshima's grandfather, Hisatarō. After being destroyed in the 1945 air raid on Fukuyama, it was rebuilt by Mr. Oshima's father, Hisami, shortly after the end of the war. The current three-story Noh theater was built on the same site in 1971. Regular performances have been held four times a year since 1958.
